# **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

It is with a sense of fulfillment I write this President Report sharing some of the activities and successes of our organization in 2019.

On behalf of Papua New Guinea Swimming Inc. (PNGSI) I offer my sincere thanks to the PNGSI executive members and our 3 affiliated Clubs; Boroko Amateur Swimming Club (BASC), Lae Amateur Swimming Club (LASC) and PNG Masters, who provided the setting for our athletes to train, stay motivated, develop new skills, and participate in competitions such as Club Carnivals and Club Championships.

There are so many of our members, (dedicated volunteers) often in the background who keep our aquatic sport functioning, either as administrators, coaches, committee members or technical officials, ensuring that our member families enjoy swimming at its various levels. Well done – your work is truly appreciated.

As we contemplate the year gone by, our successes and challenges, we can be proud and satisfied that our development is progressing on a positive pathway. 2019 was an encouraging year of growth for PNGSI, both on the competition stage and in providing training and educational programs for our members.

It was a year where we were able to gauge our future strategy to enable successful outcomes moving forward and to provide the best pathways to deliver our sport into the future, seeking ways to improve on the delivery of activities with positive development.

We began the year by thanking outgoing Patron, Mr Bart Philemon for his support of PNGSI since 2013. We were honoured and privileged to have him on our executive over the many years of his patronage and wish him well.

Our support partners and sponsors in 2019; FINA (providing Education, Competitions and financial support under their National Federation Support program); Oceania Swimming Association (OSA) our Continental body; PNGOC for financial and competition support; Bank South Pacific the major sponsor of PNGSI providing PGK80,000 towards our BSP National Aquatic Excellence program for our swimmers and alongside FINA, the educational programs for our volunteers and our competition sponsors; Theodist Ltd and PNG Air Freight (TNT) both providing funding support of PGK10,000 respectively towards our two National Championship events, which provided the opportunity for our young athletes to compete and learn the fundamentals of racing in the true spirit of sportsmanship.

All our stakeholders enabled us to develop, strengthen and improve our activities throughout the year. Thank you.

#### Educational activities held in 2019

The inaugural **FINA Coaches Certification Course - Assistant Coach Level (L1)** was held in Port Moresby at the Taurama Aquatic Centre from the 8-10 March 2019, under the direction of FINA Coach Assessor, John Bladon. Fifteen (15) Club coaches from Lae and Port Moresby were accredited at the conclusion.

A **FINA Technical Officials Workshop** was held in Lae from 25-29 September in conjunction with the 2019 PNG TNT National Swimming Championships conducted by FINA Technical Swimming Committee expert Lesley Huckins.

PNGSI held its **FINA Aquatics Day** under the FINA programme "Swimming for All, Swimming for Life" celebrating aquatic sports on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> November at the Taurama Aquatic Centre in Port Moresby, National Capital District and the primary campus of Lae International School pool in Lae, Morobe Province.

Competitions sanctioned by PNGSI in 2019

#### National competitions:

- I. **Dolphin Sprints,** Port Moresby, National Capital District hosted by BASC

#### International competitions:

#### I. Arafura Games, Darwin, Australia Apr 27-May 4

13 swimmers and 4 officials took part in the 2019 Arafura Games, bringing home 21 medals, including 15 individual and 6 relay medals.

#### II. XVI Pacific Games Apia, Samoa July 7-19

10 swimmers and 2 officials were endorsed by PNG Olympic Committee to travel to the XVI Pacific Games held in Apia, Samoa from 7-20 July. Five (5) PNG Technical Officials were invited to attend through an invitation from the Samoan Games Organising Committee and Technical Director to officiate. A Silver and a Bronze medal were awarded to Ryan Maskelyne for his 200m Breaststroke and 100m Breaststroke respectively.

#### III. 18th FINA World Swimming Championships Gwangju, South Korea July 21-28

A 4-member 2020 Tokyo Olympic Games train on squad swim team and 3 officials represented PNG. A PNG Record was recorded in the 4 x 100m Mixed Medley Relay in a time of 4:18.99 by swimmers Sam Seghers, Ryan Maskelyne, Georgia-Leigh Vele, and Judith Meauri.

PNGSI recognises that the Athlete's welfare is a priority within our organisation providing a supportive, positive and safe environment for our athletes to enjoy and grow in aquatic sport. Those elected on to an Athletes' Committee in 2019 to enable the athletes' voices to be heard for the improvement of sport, good governance, and help safeguard the credibility of our sport whilst protecting the rights of our athletes. PNGSI acknowledges the achievement of two of our past athletes and one present athlete being named on various Athlete committees both Nationally and Internationally and they are:

PNG is fortunate enough to have some very hard-working volunteer coaches who provide the necessary education and teaching skills for our swimmers to learn in a positive, effective and safe training environment. We acknowledge and appreciate the work they are doing in the Clubs.

We recognize the pleasing progress of our athletes who were named on the PNGSI BSP Kundu National Aquatic Excellence Program in 2019. This program provides an incentive for our athletes to triumph; a pathway to strive for achievement and success.

During 2019, Oceania Swimming Association (OSA) held a 2-day strategic planning workshop and AGM in Nadi, Fiji on 15-16 June 2019 for all its National Federation affiliates. The workshop was made possible through the FINA Continental funding support to OSA. PNGSI was represented by 2 delegates and 2 athlete representatives.

Sadly, our Oceania region lost a great friend in swimming, Mr Dennis Miller (OSA President / FINA Vice President) who passed away on the 1<sup>st</sup> June prior to the workshop.

PNGSI, also sadly saw the passing of LASC swimmer 18-year old Tanguy Langelet on the 31<sup>st</sup> August (a member of the BSP National Target Excellence Squad).

The last quarter in 2019 provided a time to reflect, a time to plan and set goals and be fully motivated to continue the work to allow our sport to grow with the support of all members affiliated to PNGSI. And, as we journey into 2020 our aim will be to do more, and do it better, understanding that the sweetest victory is the one that's most difficult. The one that requires us to reach down deep inside and believe in our capability that success is possible. It is through hard work, enthusiasm, preparedness, and the ability to handle the pressures and demands in all areas of our organisation that results will occur.

As we reflect on what has been, I take this opportunity to once again thank the executive of PNGSI, our stakeholders and affiliates and look forward to enjoying the ongoing pursuit towards excellence in 2020.

I would like to acknowledge Renie Quinto from Sinton Spence and Cherise Silvestre-Sagun for completing the audit of PNGSI's accounts for the year 2019. I would also like to express my gratitude for the Secretary's assistance in supporting me in my role as Treasurer.


The accounts indicate a profit of K110,871.00 of which K85,008.50 were funds from FINA 2018 Olympic Aquatic Support Program (OASP) but only received late in 2019 after a meeting held with FINA at the World Championships in Korea in July.

The K80,000 BSP Sponsorship funds have been distributed to education of coaches and Technical Officials attending the FINA Coaches Certificate Level 1 and FINA Technical Officials Clinic, and assisted with Arafura Games in Darwin.

We received K11,000.00 from Papua New Guinea Olympic Committee (PNGOC) for preparations for Pacific Games 2019 (PG2019). This covered the expenses of Rick Van Der Zant coming up in January for a training camp in Lae and Port Moresby, as well as airfares for the LASC Target Squad members to attend the PG2019 trials at the Theodist National Championships.

### **REPORT OF THE AUDITOR**

#### SCOPE

#### The financial statements – responsibility and content

The preparation of the financial statements, being a special purpose financial statements, for the year ended 31st December 2019 is the responsibility of the Committee of the Association. It has been prepared for distribution to the members for the purpose of fulfilling the Committee's financial reporting requirements under the Association's Constitution.

The Committee has determined that the accounting policies used and described in Note 1 are consistent with the financial reporting requirements of the Association's Constitution and are appropriate to meet the needs of the members.

#### The auditor's role and work

We conducted an independent audit of the financial statements in order to express an opinion on it to the members of the Association. No opinion is expressed as to whether the accounting policies used are appropriate to meet the needs of the members. We disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this audit report, or on the financial statements to which it relates to any person other than the members, or for any purpose other than for that which they were prepared.

Our role was to conduct the audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing. The audit did not involve an analysis of the prudence of business decisions made by the Committee.

In conducting the audit, we carried out a number of procedures to assess whether in all material respects the financial statements presents fairly a view which is consistent with our understanding of the Association's financial position and its financial performance in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1. These accounting policies do not require the application of all International Financial Reporting Standards.

The procedures included:

- selecting and examining evidence, on a test basis, to support amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. This included testing, as required by auditing standards, certain internal controls, transactions and individual items. We did not examine every item of available evidence,
- obtaining written confirmation regarding material representations made to us in connection with the audit,
- reviewing the overall presentation of information in the financial statements.

Our opinion was formed on the basis of these procedures.

#### Independence

As auditor, we are required to be independent of the Association and free of interests that could be incompatible with integrity and objectivity. In respect of this engagement, we followed the independence requirements set out by Certified Practising Accountants Papua New Guinea.

# NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2019

### 1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements comply with applicable financial reporting standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements approved for use in Papua New Guinea by the Accounting Standards Board (ASB).

The fundamental accounting assumptions recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of results, cashflows and the financial position have been followed in the preparation of these financial statements.

Unless otherwise stated, the accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous year.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

#### (a) <u>Historical Cost Convention</u>

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and have not been adjusted to take account of the current costs of specific assets of their impact on the operating results, or changes in the general purchasing power of the kina.

#### (b) <u>Recognition of Revenue and Expenditure</u>

All revenue and expenditure is taken to account in accordance with the principle of matching income and expenses.

Revenue from donations and fund raising activities is recognised only when received.

(c) <u>Cash</u>

For the purpose of the cash flows, cash includes cash on hand and current accounts in banks, net of bank overdrafts. Cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash.

#### (d) Fixed assets

The fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. The carrying amount of fixed assets is reviewed periodically by the committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets.

Depreciation is calculated on the straight line method so as to write off the new costs of the various classes of fixed assets during their effective working lives. Additions are depreciated from the date of purchase in the year of acquisition.

The principal annual rates in use are:-

Office equipment 15.00% to 30.00%

#### (e) <u>Comparatives</u>

Where necessary, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to current disclosures and reclassification of balances. This has not resulted in any adjustment to net assets or the members' funds account.

The mixed relays were once again a hit, offering an accessible teams event format for all federations. During the 7 days of swimming competition, the Reporters Academy generated over 85 press releases for the 13 Pacific Island federations not to mention extensive social media exposure for our athletes.



This year saw the successful introduction of direct FINA support funding for Federations and our Continental Association allowing us to invest in development initiatives across the board. The new FINA Pools for All programme will

commence in 2020 with a short list of candidate countries already identified. No doubt Dennis would be proud to see many of the initiatives that he championed at FINA level coming to light for Oceania. Looking forward, 2020 will be a big year for Oceania aquatics with the Oceania Championships in Fiji and of course the Tokyo Olympic Games.

All in all, 90 + swimmers took to the water where we witnessed some exciting racing in all age groups and divisions over the weekend.

# INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION REPORTS

# Arafura Games – Darwin, Australia

27 to 30 April 2019



AFTER an eight year hiatus, the Northern Territory Government once again held the Arafura Games in Darwin from the 27<sup>th</sup> to 30<sup>th</sup> April.

An enthusiastic, 13 member PNG Swim Team and 4 officials attended the 2019 Games. The swimming competition was held at the FINA compliant Parap 50m Swimming Pool complex in Parap, Darwin.

Teams represented in the pool competition were from the Australian states of Northern Territory, Queensland, New South Wales, Western Australia and international swimmers from Cook Islands, Solomon Islands, Indonesia, Malaysia, Philippines and Papua New Guinea. The Papua New Guinea swim team were made up of onshore swimmers from the Boroko & Lae Swimming Clubs.

Assisting our swimmers to provide the best environment for them during competition were Australian Swim Coach Rick Van Der Zant, Assistant PNG Coach Shane Akara & Team Managers' Beatrice Geita & Jean Vava.









The Arafura Games which fosters goodwill between sporting neighbours and shared sporting and cultural knowledge within the Asia-Pacific region saw our swimmers bring out the best in themselves to perform at the next level.

Four swimmers progressed from the Kundu Bronze Target National Aquatic Excellence Squad into the Kundu Silver Target Squad. They were: 17 year Tanguy Langelet, 22 year old Anthea Murray, 20 year old Lorani Moses and 15 year old Rehema Kalate.

At the close of competition the Papua New Guinea Swim Team brought home 21 medals, including individual and relay medals, along with many personal best times being recorded throughout the competition.





Coach Rick Van Der Zant summed up the performances as massive.

"The competition is complete but all the athletes are now thinking about their preparations and what they can do now to make improvements in and out of the pool before the next competition. The managers and coaches combined to provide the very best opportunity and environment for our swimmers to perform at their best. We have had lots of fabulous support by the local PNG citizens that live here in Darwin. We have met so many people, made lots of good friends and have been welcomed with open arms in Darwin for the Arafura Games. This has been an awesome opportunity for our athletes to perform abroad and we thank PNGSI for their support of this important competition for the development of swimming in Papua New Guinea."

# PACIFIC GAMES - Apia, Samoa 7 to 19 July 2019



The 2019 XVI Pacific Games was the sixteenth edition of the Pacific Games. The Games were held in Apia, Samoa, from July 7-20 2019.

The PNG Swim team at the Pacific Games was made up of 10 swimmers and officials.

Officials: Manager Jean Vava, Coach Rick Van Der Zant.

Male swimmers: Livingston Aika, Holly John, Leonard Kalate, Ryan Maskelyne, Samuel Seghers, Josh Tarere. Female swimmers: Judith Meauri, Anthea Murray, Britney Murray and Georgia-Leigh Vele.

The Games showcased the participation of more that 3000 athletes from 22 Pacific Nations in 28 sports and disciplines. The Pacific Games, formerly known as the South Pacific Games, was established with the view to creating bonds of kindred friendship and brotherhood amongst people of the countries of the Pacific region through sporting exchange without any distinctions as to race, religion or politics.

The Pacific Games was to ensure the efficient promotion and development of sports amongst the Pacific Nations and their peoples, with the first country to host the event being Fiji in 1963.

The pool events took place at the Aquatic Centre Faleata with swimmers from 15 nations competing across five days of competition.

The event also acted as a qualifier for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games.

Part of Coaches report from Rick Van Der Zant .....

DAY ONE arriving into Samoa: After flying through the night, we arrived in Apia at around 6:30 in the morning. Transition from the airport to the village went very smoothly where we were greeted by many members of the Papua New Guinea team. After settling in we were driven down to the dining hall for breakfast where we caught up with the rest of our swim team. A training session took place in the afternoon. All swimmers looked very positive in and out of the water.

DAY TWO preparing for competition: After breakfast we made our way to the pool at around 8:30am while in the afternoon I took our sole open water competitor Holly John to the venue where he will be taking part in the 5km. I had a swim with him in the ocean and this I believe was crucial to his preparation for Monday. He familiarised himself with the water, the jetty and the general feel for the area. A great venue and we were all looking forward to supporting Holly in the first event on the aquatic schedule. This followed with another workout at the pool. All athletes completed their workouts well.

DAY THREE saw the Opening Ceremony take place: We headed to the pool for another workout before lunch. All team members completed their specific workouts in preparation for their racing starting day four. After training Jean and myself attended the team leaders meeting clarifying all the questions association with such a meet. The meeting was productive allowing us to finalise our entries. The heavens opened up with the opening ceremony held late into the afternoon. The PNG Team were the first to walk out on to the arena as the previous hosts of the Pacific Games in 2015. What an awesome feeling. So many proud athletes, coaches and officials.

DAY FOUR open water begins: An early start today as we had Holly John competing 45 minutes away in the Open Water 5km championship. What a fabulous effort by Holly stopping the clock a 1hr 22:43. Holly finished in 9<sup>th</sup> place and kept a really solid pace and tempo going throughout. The wind was blowing quite solidly chopping up the water making it a huge challenge swimming into the wind. Holly did some ice bath recovery with a well-deserved massage. Then soon after, we were back at the pool for a training session, our last workout before the pool competition beginning Day 5. All athletes had massages in preparation for racing.



DAY FIVE Pacific Games Heats Day 1, pool competition begins: The 200m Breaststroke was the first event for our team. Ryan Maskelyne and Leonard Kalate opted to focus on their final rather than have a hit out in the morning as the event had 8 competitors only. Anthea Murray contested her first event 200m Breaststroke stopping the clock at 3:18.20. The heats of the 50m Butterfly event saw Sam Seghers 26.09 and Livingston Aika 26.47 move into the evening finals. Leonard Kalate swam a personal best 26.68 while Georgia-Leigh Vele smashed her personal best swimming a time of 29.81 which ranked her 5<sup>th</sup> in the evening finals. Judith Meauri clocked 32.40 and Britney Murray 31.65.



DAY FIVE Finals Day 1: Our 200m Breaststroke finalists carved up the pool. Leading the way with a silver medal was Ryan Maskelyne swimming a 2-year personal best of 2:17.51. Team mate Leonard Kalate improved his seasonal best 2:27.16 to finish in 6<sup>th</sup> place. Anthea Murray improved 6 seconds on her heat's effort 3:12.61 to finish in 6<sup>th</sup> place in the final of the female 200m Breaststroke. Sam Seghers 25.94 and Livingston Aika 26.74 finished in 7 & 8 place respectively in the 50m Butterfly finals with Sam swimming a seasonal best. Georgia-Leigh Vele continued her great form in improving on her heats personal best performance stopping the clock at 29.67 and finishing a very close 6<sup>th</sup> place. Our men's 4 x 100m Medley Relay finished a very credible 4<sup>th</sup> place while the women's finished in a credible 5<sup>th</sup> place.



DAY SIX Pacific Games Heats Day 2: Britney Murray got our team off to a great start with a seasonal best 33.46 and a finals qualification in the 50m Backstroke. Livingston Aika swam a personal best time of 29.81 to secure a spot on the reserves bench in the same event while Josh Tarere swam a seasonal best of 30.55. The 100m Butterfly saw Georgia-Leigh Vele smash her personal best and qualifying for the final swimming a time of 1:10.41. Team mate Anthea Murray also swam a best time of 1:18.51. Sam Seghers and Livingston Aika had solid swims in this event clocking 58.06 and 61.98 respectively.

DAY SIX Finals Day 2: Britney Murray swam 33.14 to finish in 6<sup>th</sup> place in the final of the 50m Backstroke. Britney attacked the sprint a little different to the heats to swim faster in the finals. Georgia-Leigh Vele swam 1:10.82 in the 100m Butterfly to finish a credible 7<sup>th</sup>. Our 4 x 200m Freestyle Relays provided lots of excitement with both teams finishing in 4<sup>th</sup> place. Great effort by both our teams.

DAY SEVEN Pacific Games Heats Day 3: The 200m Freestyle was the first event for the day. Sam Seghers qualified for the evening final in a solid 1:58.65. Josh Tarere 2:12.75, a personal best time and Holly John 2:12.97 swam close to his best. Georgia-Leigh Vele 2:23.52 and Judith Meauri 2:31.78 performed well in their 200m Freestyle event. Britney Murray 1:16.10 qualified for the 100m Backstroke final while team mate Livingston Aika 67.64 swam a solid heats swim but missed the final. All three swimmers entered in the 50m Breaststroke sprint qualified for the evening finals. Ryan Maskelyne continues his PB onslaught stopping the clock at 29.88. Team mates Leonard Kalate 30.82 and Anthea Murray 39.35 will also feature in the finals.

DAY SEVEN Finals Day 3: Sam Seghers dropped more than a second on his heat's effort 1:57.54 to finish 7<sup>th</sup> in the 200m Freestyle final. Britney Murray swam a seasonal best in the final of the 100m Backstroke 1:13.98. Ryan Maskelyne 29.85 and Leonard Kalate 30.96 finished 6<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> respectively in their 50m Breaststroke final. That was another personal best for Ryan! Anthea Murray improved her heats to finals time finishing 6<sup>th</sup> with a 38.91. Both our male and female 4 x 100m Freestyle Relay teams excelled in the finals both finishing in 5<sup>th</sup> place.

DAY EIGHT Pacific Games Heats Day 4: Our 200m Individual Medley competitors excelled in their heats. Georgia-Leigh Vele 2:42.55 and Ryan Maskelyne 2:12.08 both swam personal bests to secure a spot in the evening finals. Holly John swam a personal best in the 1500m Freestyle in a time of 20:25.60. In the 100m Freestyle event Judith Meauri clocked 63.73, a season best, Sam Seghers 52.71 and Leonard Kalate 54.53 all secure spots in the finals. Josh Tarere 57.08 (seasonal best), Georgia-Leigh Vele 64.89 seasonal best and Anthea Murray 68.17 all put in solid performances.

DAY EIGHT Finals Day 4: After gutsy efforts in the morning by both our IM swimmers they beat their personal bests again. Georgia-Leigh Vele swam a 2:42.22 to finish 7<sup>th</sup> while Ryan Maskelyne 2:11.98 finished 5<sup>th</sup>. Judith Meauri 63.76 finished 6<sup>th</sup> in the final of the 100 Freestyle. Both Sam Seghers 53.04 and Leonard Kalate 54.65 finished 6<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> respectively. The final event for the night, our mixed 4 x 50 Freestyle Relay, finish in 5<sup>th</sup> place.






DAY NINE Pacific Games Heats Day 5: The final day of heats saw many great performances by our team. The 100m Breaststroke were first cab off the rank. All three swimmers qualified for the evening finals, Ryan Maskelyne 65.31, Leonard Kalate 67.66 and Anthea Murray 1:29.49. Sam Seghers 24.13 and Judith Meauri 28.65 both qualified for the evening finals in the 50m Freestyle event. Georgia-Leigh Vele 28.91 swam a personal best as did Britney Murray 30.24. Josh Tarere 25.55 and Livingston Aika 25.81 finished their meet with solid heats efforts.

DAY NINE Finals Day 5: Bronze medal to PNG tonight in the first event! Ryan Maskelyne smashed his personal best in the 100m Breaststroke to stop the clock at 64.24. Team mate Leonard Kalate swam 67.47. Anthea Murray clocked 1:30.30 in the 100m Breaststroke just shy of her heats effort but followed it up with a seasonal best in the 200m Butterfly 3:11.03 just 35 minutes later. Sam Seghers swam a 24.34 to finish 7<sup>th</sup> in the 50m Freestyle while Judith Meauri swam 0.01 faster than her season best heats effort. A relay finished off our Pacific Games campaign with a very credible 5<sup>th</sup> place. It was the mixed 4 x 50m Medley Relay.







# **CLUB REPORTS**

## Boroko Amateur Swim Club (BASC)

For Boroko Amateur Swimming Club 2019 was a quietly successful year. Our major competitions, the PNG Dolphin Sprints and the Club Championships, we were well-supported, and our fundraising gala dinner a particular success.

BASC provided strong teams for the PNGSI promoted events, the Theodist National Championships, and the TNT Short Course Championships heroically hosted by Lae Amateur Swimming Club.



This year was characterised by a significant uplift in parental engagement and interest in the Club. Our carnivals were well supported, and the often challenging task of garnering technical officials from the parent body, a little less difficult as the volunteering effort of many was wonderful.

#### **Dolphin Sprints**

Held on the weekend of 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> May, the Dolphin Sprints included 30 events for which there were 250 individual entries from 58 swimmers, and 163 medals won. Some 28 technical officials oversaw the event. Swimming performances, whilst reasonable, were not outstanding. This may have been related to the timing of the event being early May. The Dolphins are traditionally held on the later date of Queen's Birthday weekend. Nonetheless, the carnival was well patronised and conducted in an enjoyable atmosphere with our new BBQ facilities a most popular addition.

#### **Club Championships**

Again, well supported by all Club members, the Club Championships were held on the weekend of 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> November. There were 197 individual entries from 43 athletes competing in 43 events. Overall performances were reasonable without being exceptional, although some of our younger swimmers are coming through the ranks very well, and auger a bright future for PNG swimming if we can retain them.

#### **Club Carnivals**

The Club held seven carnivals this year. These were all held on a Saturday afternoon which, unfortunately does not suit everyone. Nonetheless, these were well supported by the parents and swimmers and conducted in a friendly atmosphere. They continued to provide an excellent training and competition familiarization environment, especially for the younger swimmers, as well as exposing parents and family friends to the technical official aspects needed for successful competitions. The coaches used these Carnivals to help improve their swimmer's technique.

#### Gala Dinner

A clear highlight of our year was the Gala Dinner held at the Gateway Hotel. Attracting over 250 guests and raising over K50,000, the success of this event was due to the tireless efforts of our small fundraising team of committed parents. Apart from being an enjoyable event in which we are able to celebrate the Club's efforts and our children's joy in team swimming, it is also an important fundraiser. We could not continue to provide the level of coaching and the facilities we currently enjoy at our present fee levels without the generous support we receive from so many people and businesses through this Gala Dinner.

#### Coaching

Our coaching team, led by Villiawa Puana, continued to provide wonderful, dedicated support to our young swimmers. Each of the coaches takes his or her role very seriously which is manifested in their attention to each of their charges and the pleasure they derive in seeing each child grow in confidence, capability and, most importantly, teamwork and friendships.

#### **Aqua Kiddies**

This year we launched Aqua Kiddies. This is a learn-to-swim program for existing members of the Club. It is not available to non members, or the public, as such, as might be the case in a privately run program. However, it offers member families the opportunity, at an affordable rate, to provide swimming lessons for their younger ones and for those to eventually join their older siblings in squad training as they progress to a 25m swimming capability. The Aqua Kiddies program was ably introduced and conducted by Susan Babao.

The Theodist National Long Course Championships saw Shannon Liew, Ryan Pini, Ashley Seeto and Josh Wheeler representing PNG Masters. The Championships saw Shannon, Ryan and Ashley breaking 6, 1 and 1 PNG Masters National Records respectively. In the 400m Freestyle, Shannon accomplished an incredible feat of breaking the 100m, 200m and 400m Freestyle records in the one swim!

Shannon also represented PNG Masters at the Masters Swimming Queensland State Championships in April at the Sleeman Aquatic Centre in Chandler, Brisbane, where he had not raced for 20 years. He came home from the meet with 4 Gold medals and 1 Silver medal and also managed to break or set 5 PNG Masters National records along the way.

Unfortunately, despite their best intentions, none of our members were able to attend the World Masters Swimming Championships, which were held in Gwangju, South Korea. By all accounts, it was an amazing event that brought together Masters swimmers across the globe in the name of fun, fitness and friendship.

One of our member coaches, Rick Van Der Zant, was named as Head Coach for the PNG Swimming Team that travelled to compete at the first Arafura Games to be held in 8 years in Darwin, Northern Territory. The young team gained valuable competition and travel experience and produced some great results under Rick's guidance.

Rick's association with PNG Swimming dates back to 1992, when our President, Shannon Liew joined the AJ's Algester Swimming Club under Rick's mentorship. He would end up coaching Shannon for 7 years at AJ's and Yeronga Park, taking Shannon to multiple Queensland State Championships, Australian Age Championship medals and Australian Open Club Relay Championships. Rick also hosted Boroko and PNG Swim Teams when they travelled to Brisbane for Queensland State Championships.

From there, a number of PNG swimmers, including Ben Wells, Ryan Pini and Anna-Liza Mopio-Jane would join Rick's squad. Ryan's achievements are well known, including his amazing Gold and Silver Medals in the 100 Butterfly at the 2006 and 2010 Commonwealth Games and the Beijing Olympic Games final where Michael Phelps touched out Milorad Cavic by one one hundredth of a second (0.01) to set him up to win an amazing 8 Gold Medals at one Olympics. Ben also represented PNG at the 2002 Commonwealth Games and Anna-Liza at the Beijing Olympics.

I'm sure everyone in the PNG Swimming community would agree that it is great to have Rick back to support and contribute our young swimmers to achieve the best results they can.

Increasing the number of certified coaches and enhancing the quality of the existing ones. The FINA Certification is valid for 4 years.

It is a great initiative of FINA & will see our PNG Coaches being able to secure a FINA Swim Coach accreditation. Would also like to thank BSP for their support of development education in the sport of swimming.

Fourteen participants from the schools and swimming club took part. The clinic covered all aspects of running a competition under the rules and regulations of FINA including the Professional conduct of an Official on pool deck and detailing the roles and responsibilities of all involved. FINA DVD on Strokes were viewed with correct technique, while disqualification cards were discussed, with the emphasis being on the 'benefit of doubt' goes to the swimmer. To close the clinic an exam was held.

#### The FINA World Aquatic Day was developed

in 2016 during the FINA Bureau Meeting held in Budapest, Hungary, a worldwide aquatic day was recognized to be held annually to celebrate the aquatic sports around the world.

A program that aims at reducing the alarming numbers of lives lost by drowning annually by raising awareness of the importance of this basic life skill, the capacity to swim.

The accreditation program, which is recognised worldwide as providing a strong uniform foundation for Coaches, will further grow and enrich our Coach Development program both in the learn to swim development area and biomechanics and Stroke Technique in squad training programs.


